Q6 Somewhat agree

Q7 Theoretically, devolving Powers and Funding to local areas brings key policy and delivery decision making closer to the community which benefits from those decisions, thus providing the community with a stronger input through local democratic representation

Put simply, the imposition of an elected Mayor is too high a price for a small increase in funding.

The Devolution Deal, over the 30 year period, would be subject to amendment by future Governments

That introducing a 2/3 majority requirement for amendments to resolutions is a regressive step compared to the current system of a simple majority for County Council Plans and Budgets

Mayor for Cornwall Consultation

This consultation asks for your opinion on the proposed devolution deal for Cornwall which includes the election of a Mayor for Cornwall (and replaces the current system of an elected Chair of the council). You can choose to take part in the consultation as an individual resident (search online for 'Lets talk cornwall mayor') or make a collective response as a parish council. The survey closes on 17 February 2023.

The box below summarises the key parts of the consultation. You may wish to read sections 7 and 8 before considering the other questions. The key question (which asks if you support an elected Mayor for Cornwall) is number 11. You do not have to answer every question.

The results of the consultation will be used by Cornwall councillors help them decide if there should be a referendum to choose a Mayor. This will be discussed and voted on at the full council meeting scheduled for 18 April 2023. If councillors agree to hold a referendum, the date will be announced in due course. If the decision is taken to elect a Mayor (by whatever means), this will be part of the county elections held on 2 May 2024.

Key powers and funding the Deal would bring

- Secure long-term funding for local priorities
- Control of a new £360 million Cornwall Investment Fund over 30 years to drive growth and take forward our priorities over the longer term.
- Grow a creative and innovative carbon zero economy
- Up to £10 million for a 3-year innovation programme to invest in innovative businesses that will help rebalance the Cornish economy.
- A boost to Cornwall's ability to capitalise on our natural clean energy resources:
- Support to create a Cornwall Floating Offshore Wind Commission.
- Help to fast-track connecting the Langarth development to a zero-carbon geothermal heat source.
- More influence over the planning of our future energy infrastructure.
- More control to ensure training & skills provision meets the needs of the local economy and helps local people to get good jobs, including:
- Devolution of the core Adult Education Budget.
- Input into the new Local Skills Improvement Plans.
- Address the housing crisis.
- A Cornwall Land Commission to increase the delivery of new affordable homes and regeneration schemes on public sector-owned land.

Your views on accepting the Deal, including the change to an elected Mayor which is a requirement of the Deal

In order that powers and funding are given to Cornwall Council, Government requires the Council to make changes to its governance arrangements. The main change is to move to an elected Mayor who would provide a single point of accountability to the people of Cornwall. They could also serve as an ambassador for Cornwall at a national and international level to attract more funding to Cornwall.

The proposed governance changes would include:

- Changing from a Leader and Cabinet to an elected Mayor and Cabinet. Currently the Leader is elected by the 87 members of the Council. The elected Mayor would be directly elected by Cornwall residents eligible to vote. The elected Mayor would appoint between 2-9 members of the Council to form their Cabinet just like the Leader does now.
- The annual budget and plans and strategies proposed by the elected Mayor and Cabinet would continue to require a majority vote at Council to pass. Any amendments, not accepted by the Mayor and Cabinet would change from requiring a majority vote to a two-thirds vote to pass.
- At least one Overview and Scrutiny Committee that would hold the elected Mayor and Cabinet to account on matters relating to the Devolution Deal. This Committee would have a Chair and Vice Chair from a different political party to the elected Mayor.
- Decisions currently taken by the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Local Enterprise Partnership would become the responsibility of the Council.

The decision whether to accept the Deal and make the required change to an elected Mayor and Cabinet governance model would need to be agreed by a majority vote at Council. The proposed Deal and the proposed change in governance go hand in hand. Without this change in governance there is no Deal, so accepting the Deal means accepting an elected Mayor for Cornwall Council
