



St. Keyne and Trewidland Green Team

At our November meeting we talked about possible future ideas:

Energy: We would like to investigate ways in which the villages could become more energy independent. As well as looking at wider deployment of solar panels and wind turbines, there is an interest in exploring the possibility of ground source heating in this area. If you are using renewable energy sources, please do get in touch to share your insights.

Food: Building on interest at the first meeting in establishing growing spaces in the villages, we looked at the idea of helping to develop cooking skills. This could take the form of basic cookery sessions, perhaps with the help of Liskeard Food bank and would ideally make use of produce grown locally.

Access to nature: As we live in rural Cornwall, we are keen that residents are able to access the countryside around them. Steps towards this include continuing work to identify and maintain the footpaths which are available such as the new walking route between Liskeard and Looe.

Longer-term vision: We thought we should ask ourselves, 'if you had a magic wand, what would life be like in the villages in ten years' time? The idea is to be ambitious and see how much can be achieved. If you have any thoughts for this, we would love to hear them!

Trewidland Local History Group

Learning from Landlooe Bridge

The most recent Trewidland History Group Walk took in Landlooe Bridge and Plashford and allowed us to put together some of the details of the changes in residents, their jobs and how these related to the development of the Canal and Railway in the East Looe Valley.



1840 Tithe Map

The **1840 Tithe Maps and Apportionment** documents focus on ownership and occupation but also record the name, acreage and use of each numbered field. 10% Tithes were paid in kind to the Church (after the Reformation to landowners) till 1836 and in cash until 1936.

The Liskeard and Looe Union Canal opened in March 1828 to carry sand and limestone inland from Looe. 25 locks carried the canal northwards up the East Looe Valley to Moorswater below Liskeard. The canal was commercially successful until the railway (now the Liskeard and Looe branch line) was built parallel to it and opened in 1860. There is no record of waterway traffic after 1910, by which time the canal and its features had become derelict and overgrown.

The Census Documents for 1841 (the first Modern UK Census information gathered) record who actually lived at Landlooe Bridge on that date. From the 1851 census onwards places of birth were included.(Trewidland was included in South Liskeard at this time)

- **1841 Census** for Landlooe Bridge shows all those listed in occupations in agriculture or as female servants.
- **1851 Census** lists John Elford as a Butcher, and Isaac Elford and John Tamblyn as Canal boatmen.
- **1861 Census** records John Tamblyn, Daniel and John Lane as Canal Boatmen, with John Blight and Jacob Crabb recorded as Railway labourers and fifteen-year-old John Hoare as a Carter.

1891 Census lists John Stephens as a Carpenter and William S Barret as a Shoemaker.

By **1901 Census** John Stephens was still shown as a carpenter, John Crabb as a quarryman (roadstone) and his brother William Crabb as a carter but the range of occupations had narrowed considerably with most Landlooe residents employed in agriculture.



Election Countdown to 1May 2025

By the time you read this, we'll be just 2 weeks away from the official launch of county and parish council elections, and I'm asking you now to think about what you can offer your community as a parish councillor.

Ask a busy personAre you the kind of person who is busy in their community? If you are, then you already have the networks to plug into - a valuable asset for any councillor. With these links, it'll be easier for you to know what matters locally to your people. It's then up to you to bring those matters to the council meeting and be ready to argue your corner.

What's the deadline for deciding?

You have from Friday 14 March until Wednesday 2 April to decide if you want to stand. Just as important, you'll need to get your nomination papers into Cornwall Council by 4pm on that Wednesday afternoon. You'll need two people to propose and second your nomination and someone else to witness your own signing of the nomination form. There's no charge for standing in the parish election and there will be plenty of advice and quidance on Cornwall Council's website nearer the time (just Google 'cornwall parish elections 2025')

There's just time to come along to see how your own parish council works in action. We meet next on Wednesday February 12 at Trewidland Village Hall, and then again on Wednesday March 12 at St Keyne Village Hall.

The Farming Diary

As a community that is surrounded by agriculture, but for the most part having little involvement in it nowadays, we thought it might be useful for the people of St Keyne and Trewidland to have a brief insight into the agricultural calendar, how our work changes thorough the seasons, and why we can be seen doing what we do in the fields. Every farm is unique, and things will happen differently

depending on where you look and which

farm you drive past but, this is what happens at Pensipple Farm; a small, mixed family farm on the edge of Trewidland.

This year we've taken a slightly different approach in our arable rotation. With commodity prices volatile and farm gate prices stubbornly low, we decided to take advantage of the new Sustainable Farming Incentive offer on Winter Bird Food and remove spring barley from the rotation. It's the first time that we've grown a crop that is not intended for the agricultural market place, but grown for wildlife. The aim is to plant a wide variety of plants and allow them to set seed over winter to provide food and refuge for farmland birds.

As the saying goes, "Build it and they will come", and they have certainly done that! We've seen an explosion of birds on the farm this winter. I use the "Merlin" app on my phone to identify the bird song, and a full list of birds we spotted (so far) are below for those who're interested. One bird that's brought some excitement is the Yellow Hammer. We've spotted them twice on the farm in the last couple of years and, being a Red Listed Species, it means that habitat and food source (seeds and insects) are abundant. It's a good sign! The scheme lasts for 3 years so we'll see what more turns up in that time and whether the economics of food production become favourable enough to justify a more diverse range of crops.

Finally, a cautionary note. We've started noticing a lot more folk walking dogs around the farm in recent months. It's great that people feel they can get out into the countryside and enjoy nature however, we have also been noticing that gates are being left open and dog faeces are being left in fields. This suggests that some people are not respecting the countryside or our farm. We have a network of footpaths across the parish, some of which cross our fields, and we welcome and encourage you to use them but, please stick to these footpaths, do not let your dog off it's lead and pick up what it leaves behind!

Recently, I found dog mess in a field that was about to be grazed by pregnant ewes. Parasites in dog mess can readily cause ewes to abort their lambs, which is not something any of us what to have to deal with. Also, with ewes now mid-way through their pregnancy, not just here but likely all over the parish, they are particularly susceptible to the stress of being chased or attacked by loose dogs, which will also cause them to abort their lambs. You might think your dog is only

What exactly is walking football and what is it all about at Dobwalls Walking Football Club?

First thing is that we are really a social club who happen to play football rather than a Football Club that have a social side. The emphasis is on fun, well-being and socialising and making friends. Done mainly from playing football at a slow pace (Walking speed) but also through regular social activities. Whether it be a meet up for a drink or a coffee. Or a trip to play football golf or the bowling alley. We also have the odd meal out as well as a larger Christmas party.

The occasional match against other like-minded clubs with cakes and food afterwards and either a hot drink or something from the bar at the football club.

The game itself is of course based on football, but a small sided game of 6 players on each side.

There is no contact allowed. People must walk. No running, no jogging allowed. The idea being is people walk and there is no contact then it is far safer.

Is there a minimum age?

Simple answer is no. Although typically the ladies tend to be 40 plus and men 50 plus. But we do have someone in their twenties and another in his thirties. It is more about the attitude of the person than their age that counts.

I've never played before. Is there any point in coming along? Probably 30% or more of our recreational players have never kicked a ball before coming along.

So absolutely yes is the answer. We still have a few experienced older heads who are they purely to help the newbies. You will be surprised how easy it is to play with a few sessions and enjoy yourself.

I've played before and want to get fit again? Is there a session for me? The club now has 4 distinct sessions and people are only put into environments which they are comfortable with and where it is safe for them to play. These are:

1. Recreational session. So purely about fun and enjoyment. This is not competitive at all.

It is played at an ambling/strolling speed and is nice and relaxed pace.

2. Intermediate session. For people that want a little bit of

competition beyond the recreational sessions and want to move about a bit quick whilst still walking and improve their ability.

3. Competitive session. For those that want to play and take it reasonably seriously and have attained a reasonable level of ability.

4. League Squad. We have a very able and successful league and cup team. These sessions are training sessions to improve and is aimed at getting the team to play better as a group.

How are the sessions managed and who decides if someone is not walking?

We have trained and qualified refs at all sessions to both make sure people stay within the Laws/Rules of the game and importantly the players are safe. Safety is the no.1 priority in all games.

Beef Roulades

4 thin cut steaks, sweet paprika spice, salt and pepper, 3 tbls mustard, 8 smoked streaky bacon rashers, 100g thin sliced onion, 1 gherkin sliced 4 times length ways

500ml stock and some water to keep the casserole dish moist for braising some red wine (optional)

oil or butter for frying Some tomato puree 30g flour

Spread the paprika, salt and pepper and mustard on the 4 thin steaks, place one slice of the gherkin on each steak length ways and 2 slices of streaky bacon also length ways, top with a thin layer of onion. Roll each steak along the short side and secure the roll with string or a cocktail stick.

Heat up some frying fat in a casserole dish and fry the roulades on all sides, then add some water or red wine and to the dish to braise the roulades, keep topping up the dish with liquid and rotate the meat from time to time. After approx. 1h 30minutes, add 500ml of stock to the dish



and thicken with some tomato puree. Mix 30g of flour with water and add to the sauce to thicken to a gravy consistency. Add more red wine and paprica to taste, serve with roast potatoes and veg of your choice, I use red cabbage, but that's personal preference. Patricia Hopwood

Cornwall Councillor Liskeard South and Dobwalls

A New Year is always a good time to make resolutions but more importantly to take stock of my tasks and any unfinished business from the previous year.

I am pleased to be the Chairman of the South East Cornwall Community Area Partnership, which includes St Keyne and 28 other parishes. The SECCAP is becoming a useful platform

to raise strategic issues that impact on the collective Parishes and I am grateful for the input from the St Keyne Parish representatives.

I am continuing to keep the pressure on the Post Office to keep the main branch in Liskeard open. This service is hugely important to so many residents in the rural villages now that the banks have closed, especially to those who do not have access to internet banking.

Last year I marched across the Tamar Bridge, alongside Cllr Armand Toms and on a later date into Plymouth to attend the inquiry to campaign to the Secretary of State for no further increase to the Tamar Crossing Tolls. This is a punitive cost for the locals who use the bridge and the ferry. We are still awaiting a decision. It is vitally important to cross the Tamar for Healthcare, Employment, Education and Leisure and I strongly believe the burden of the cost should not fall only on the shoulders of the residents of SE Cornwall.

The essential upgrading of the Saltash tunnel technology continues into this year and I have been working with National Highways to ensure that residents have accurate and regularly updated information to ensure that journeys can be planned, so that delays can be minimized throughout the period of works. Any reduction in the number of vehicles using the route is helpful, if you can share transport or use public transport if available whenever possible.

In the village there has been a three-year programme to replace all standard highway streetlights with LED, to save both carbon and enhance the night time environment for nature. Alongside the programme in appropriate locations in the village streetlight have been switched off between midnight and 5.00am or

dimmed. I hope this has been received well by the residents. The public consultation for the Cornwall Wide 20mph roll out, which includes St Keyne ended on 20^{th} December and I have supported this as I believe this will make people feel safer when walking and cycling in the village.

I am always pleased to see the snowdrops peeping out, followed closely by the daffodils and primroses beginning to appear as a sign that Spring is just around the corner.

I am mindful there may still be severe cold weather and once again I ask you to look out for your neighbours. If you enjoy walking your dogs in the countryside, a timely reminder that it is lambing season. Please always keep dogs on leads on the moors and on footpaths close by to livestock.

Finally, I wish you all a wonderful springtime and a Happy Easter with your families.


Cornwall Council requests evidence statements from previous footpath users to get it reinstated on the map.

The wildlife friendly garden

Experts are advising gardeners not to tidy up too much.

Some of your debris could be left to provide food and shelter for overwintering insects, birds and mammals, so before you start raking, clearing away pruning and starting that big tidy up, spare a thought for our



native wildlife. Hibernating mammals, such as hedgehogs, frogs or toads will use leaf piles to create a nest where they will stay throughout winter, while insects and invertebrates will love the dark, damp nooks and crannies that it has to offer. In turn, this will encourage birds such as robins, black birds and sparrows to visit your garden to forage for worms and bugs in the leaf layer. Simply gather the leaves and dead organic matter from your garden or outdoor space and arrange them in a pile – don't worry if your pile looks rustic, as long as it is large enough to allow wildlife to burrow within the materials, animals will love it! If you have any logs or fallen branches, place these next to the leaf pile to provide additional shelter and security, and make sure it is located in a quiet corner of the garden where visitors can stay undisturbed throughout winter. Come springtime, remember to check leaf piles for any animals before moving or mulching.

At this time of year, you may be tempted to chop down all your spent perennials, but leave seedheads on plants such as rudbeckia, echinacea, teasels and helenium, because they will provide food for the birds, the RSPB advises. Stems can also hold insect larvae and eggs, and shield the soil from the winter elements, the charity adds. Let wildlife shelter in log piles, broken twigs and old logs. These make an ideal shelter for many species, the rotting wood and brittle bark create cosy gaps for insects to hide in, while offering mammals a dry and secure habitat over the winter. Log piles also provide birds and amphibians with a source of food, as they search the debris for any insects which might be lurking inside.

Nature can be slow to reveal her secrets, and how we treat fallen leaves is a good example. Count back three decades and most people burned their leaves, simply wanting to get rid of them. Then came the age of shredding and composting, methods meant to speed the transformation of leaves into mulch or humus-rich compost. But these days, concern about insect decline is making us rethink how we deal with leaves. Before they become compost or leaf mould, fallen leaves can serve as habitat for legions of life forms, from tiny gnats and spiders to woodlice, springtails and salamanders. Some moths and butterflies overwinter as caterpillars hidden deep in fallen leaves, while others hide out as cocoons.
